

Anna Elizabeth Corder

Elsie was born on 26 Sep 1888 to Milton Corder and Mary Gilltrap. The Corder farm was a 40 acre farm located in the Northeast corner of Callaway County, MO. It was about 3 miles, south of Martinsburg, MO. In 1890, they lost the farm due to her father's drinking. The family moved to Mexico, MO. In her teens, she and her sister, Mary Ellen (Nelly) worked at the Crown laundry. She married Thomas A Williams on 6 Apr 1910. The services were performed by the priest from St. Brendans. On 16 Jun 1913, their first child, William Warner was born. Shortly after his birth they moved to Quincy. She was a member of St. Rose of Lima church for the entire time that she lived in Quincy. She died in Quincy on 5 Feb 1974 and is buried in Calvary Cemetery.

Milton M Corder

Milton was born on 30 May 1848 in Benton County, MO to James Corder and Leah Hylton. The farm was across the river from Warsaw, MO. In the early 1840's, the family moved to a farm in the Northeast corner of Callaway County, MO. On 30 Jun 1875, Milton was arrested for pulling a gun on the county sheriff. The sheriff was about to arrest Milton's brother-in-law, James Madden. On 18 Feb 1875, Milton married Mary Gilltrap. The Gilltraps farmed about a half mile, east of the Corders. After his marriage they farmed in Audrain County near his father's farm. After the death of his father (4 Feb 1883) he bought out portions of the estate from his two brothers and two half sisters. The family lived on the farm until January of 1900 when he lost the farm to a default on a loan. The family moved to Mexico, MO. Milton had a problem with alcohol and it was not too long after they moved that he was asked to move out. He moved to the St. Louis area. His official residence was the address of his brother-in-law, John Gilltrap. A month before his death, he convert to Catholicism. He died on 21 May 1924 at his brother-in-laws. He is buried in St. Joseph Cemetery just south of Martinsburg. The cemetery is about 2 miles north of his family farm.

James Corder

James was born on 19 Dec 1804 in Montgomery County, VA to Benjamin Corder and Rebecca Runyon. When he was a teenager, the family moved to what is now Floyd County, KY. Here he married Juda Murray on 9 Feb 1826. They had two girls, Mary & Anna E. Juda died after the birth of Anna. James married Leah Hylton on 26 Aug 1832 in Floyd County. Shortly after this James and his family and his parents moved to Benton County, MO. They farmed on land about a mile due south of Warsaw, MO. Here he and Leah had three boys. In the late 1840's he purchased 40 acres of land in the Northeast corner of Callaway County, MO. The land was about 3 miles due south of Martinsburg, MO. Leah died in 1881. James died on 14 Feb 1883 on his farm. He was chopping the ice to open up water for his animals and died of a heart attack. He and Leah are buried in Mannen cemetery. It is located about a mile south of his farm. The cemetery is in the middle of a farm field and is no longer visible.

Benjamin Corder

Benjamin was born in VA about 1769 to Edward Corder II and Susannah Mary. He married Rebecca Runyon on 7 Apr 1798 in Montgomery County, VA. They stayed in Montgomery County until 1803 when they moved to Tazewell County, VA. In 1825, they moved to Lawrence County, KY. The area where they lived is now in Floyd County, KY. Sometime in the 1830's he moved to Benton County, MO and farmed about a mile due south of Warsaw, MO. They farmed there until the late 1840's when his wife died. After her death, he moved to St. Johns, OH to live with his son, John Milton Corder. He died in St. Johns on 28 Aug 1851 and is buried there.

Edward Corder II

Edward was born in VA around 1730 to Edward Corder and mother, unknown. On 6 Sep 1777 he married Susannah Mary (we do not know if Mary was her last name or middle name). From 1780 thru 1801 he lived on various farms in Montgomery County, VA. In 1802 he moved to Whythe County VA and was on the tax rolls there through 1810. It is assumed that he died around 1810 in Whythe County

Edward Corder I

Edward was born in the London area around 1700. On 6 Dec 1721, he was arrested for stealing some ribbons. He was tried in Old Bailey court and held in Newgate Prison. His plea was "for I was drunk and I did knew not what I did". He was convicted and the punishment was death by hanging. Instead the judge deported him to the Colonies. He was shipped to the Colonies on the ship, Gilbert, and arrived in Annapolis on 16 Jul 1722. He was indentured and it is believe that Lord Fairfax was the person that held his indenture. The indentures were generally for seven years.

In 1738 he secured a rental of land from Lord Fairfax. The land was in what is now Orange County, VA.

In 1749, he was working as a chainman with George Washington. They survey areas of Lord Fairfax. One of the areas was Washington, VA.

He secured another rental of land from Lord Fairfax in Frederick County, VA. This land has gotten the name the turkey track. The rental for the track of land was one turkey. It is assumed that this was an inside joke between Edward and Lord Fairfax.

Edward died in Frederick county around 1770. His burial is unknown.
